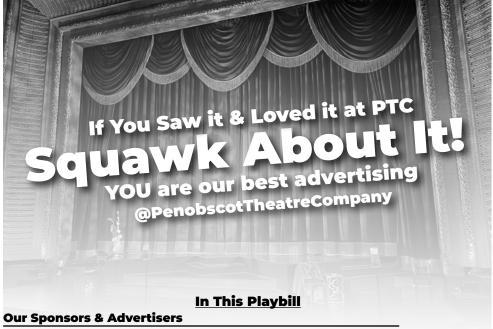


Land Acknowledgement

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A Letter from Jonathan Berry, Artistic Director

Welcome to Matinicus.

Matinicus Rock stands nearly 25 miles off of the Maine Coast in the middle of the Penobscot Bay. The lighthouse was originally built in 1827 to protect ship traffic coming up and down the coast and heading towards the docks of Portland. Even for Maine standards, the windswept and remote island proved a study in isolation for anyone tasked with keeping the light.

It is not a coincidence, then, that this play emerged out of our recent COVID 19 pandemic. Our playwright, Jenny Connell Davis, had been sent a copy of the children's book KEEP THE LIGHTS BURNING ABBIE by her mother. Stuck inside her Texas home with her own family, Jenny stared at the cover art – the young woman staring defiantly out at a churning ocean - and Jenny, having grown up along the Maine coast, couldn't help but see her young self in the image.

And in the midst of a lockdown with her family, so far away from her parents and the place she grew up, the playwright began to take the theatrical maker's path and she imagined; imagined a young girl, uprooted from her life and her friends and placed on the most remote of rocks, surrounded by ocean, with only her family and the seabirds for company. How must it have felt to be tasked with the care of her family and a sick mother while her father sailed to the mainland in search of needed supplies? When she saw the clouds darken and the water rise, what was her fear? How, in that moment, did she summon the necessary courage to continue?

Jenny never actually read the book – she did her own research and started writing. In the midst of her own frightening experience, she put herself in Abbie's shoes and imagined this young girl's courage and her heroic actions. Through imagining, she found some courage of her own to manage her own, terrifying storm. And that is, ultimately, the power of live theater. We sit in the dark till the light of a play sparks, and we imagine something together that has the power to transform hearts and minds.

While there's no way to know for certain, I would bet that if you could ask Abigail about her heroism, she would likely demure and say that she was "just doing what anyone would do under those circumstances." probably be uncomfortable with the word "hero" and focus more on how everyone contributed and banded together to survive. An ordinary person in an extraordinary moment, simply doing their part.

But, for me, that IS the definition of heroism and it happens every day. It might not always have the dramatic accompaniment of a ferocious storm, but everyday people, in every community, see a need and step into it. Not for the glory or the honor that may (or may not) accompany the act, but simply because it is something that needs to be done.

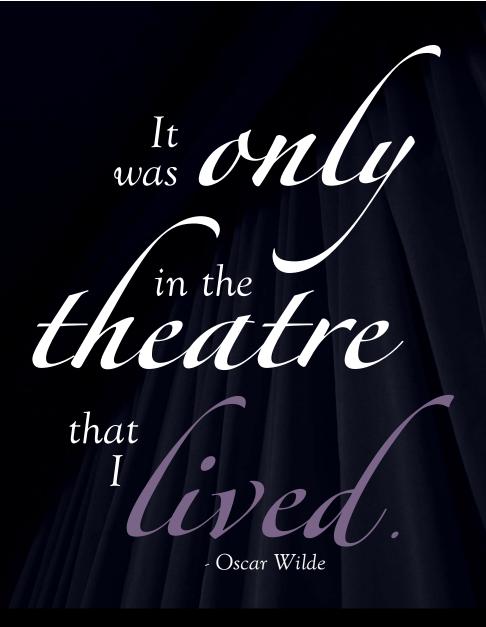

Lauren Yee, celebrated for her sharp wit and keen observations, brings audiences a comedic and satirical gem with Mother Russia. Set in 1992 St. Petersburg, the play is a vibrant and absurd exploration of post-Soviet life, complete with unexpected twists, biting humor, and poignant commentary on societal change.

What's the Story?

In the chaotic aftermath of the Soviet Union's dissolution, opportunity and absurdity abound. Mother Russia follows Evgeny and Dmitri, two hilariously inept government surveillance workers, as they attempt to navigate a world of glasnost, perestroika, and fast-food chains like McDonald's. Tasked with spying on Katya, a disgraced pop star with international allure, the duo stumbles into a whirlwind of mistaken identities, a tangled love triangle, and laughably poor espionage tactics. Yee's storytelling captures the bizarre juxtaposition of newfound freedoms and lingering Soviet-era absurdities.

What Audiences Can Expect

Audiences should prepare for a fast-paced, satirical ride through a richly textured world. The 1992 setting provides a colorful backdrop of crumbling Soviet relics and emerging capitalist chaos, with Yee's writing bringing this era to life in vivid detail. Expect a cast of outrageous characters—from bumbling spies to a captivating former pop star—and a whirlwind of clever banter and physical comedy.

Despite the humor, Mother Russia doesn't shy away from exploring deeper themes like identity, resilience, and the universal search for purpose in uncertain times. The play's balance of satire and sincerity ensures that audiences will leave both entertained and moved.

Fans of smart comedy and vivid period pieces won't want to miss this delightfully chaotic journey through post-Soviet St. Petersburg. With its sharp writing, dynamic characters, and laugh-out-loud moments, *Mother Russia* is a ticket to one of the most engaging nights at the theater you'll experience this year.





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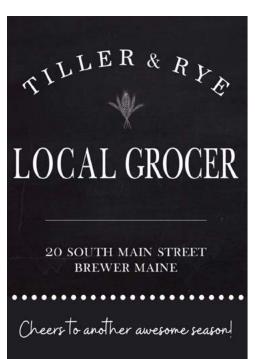
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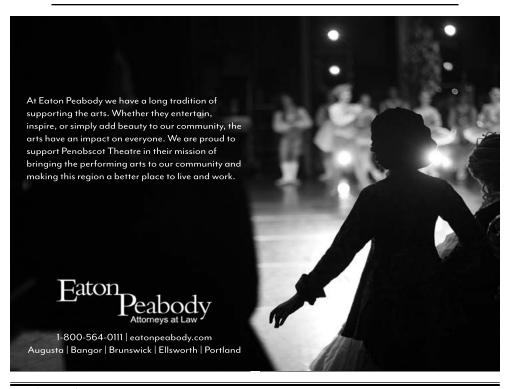

In addition to Palm Beach Dramaworks, she has been commissioned by Chance Theater, Penfold Theater, and Ars Nova. Jenny served as the in-house writer at Emmy-award-winning Baobab Studios (2022-2024), developing the stories that they iterate across tv, film, books, graphic novels, Roblox and NFT games, and VR. Her short films have screened at festivals worldwide, including SxSW and Toronto. She adapted Jennifer Weiner's The Littlest Bigfoot for Fox, and has developed projects for Amazon, Anonymous Content, Disney, and SONY. She is an Affiliate Artist with the Playwrights' Center, former member of the Ars Nova Play Group, and a recipient of grants from Ars Nova, ScriptWorks, The Playwrights' Center, and the Network of Ensemble Théatres. Jenny was a Writer in Residence at

Baltimore's Center Stage Theater, and a member of the Hyde Park Theater Playwrights Group. Jenny trained as an actor at Court and Steppenwolf theaters in Chicago, and in playwriting at UT Austin. Management: Good Fear.

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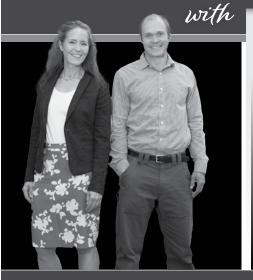
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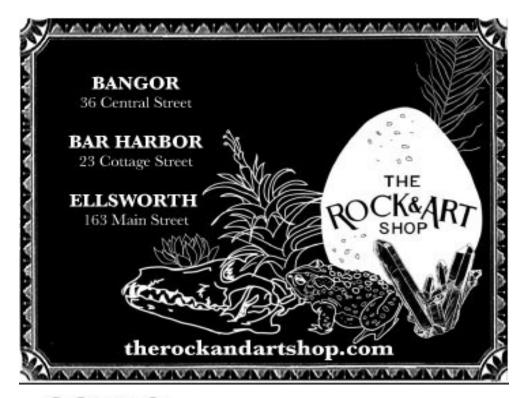


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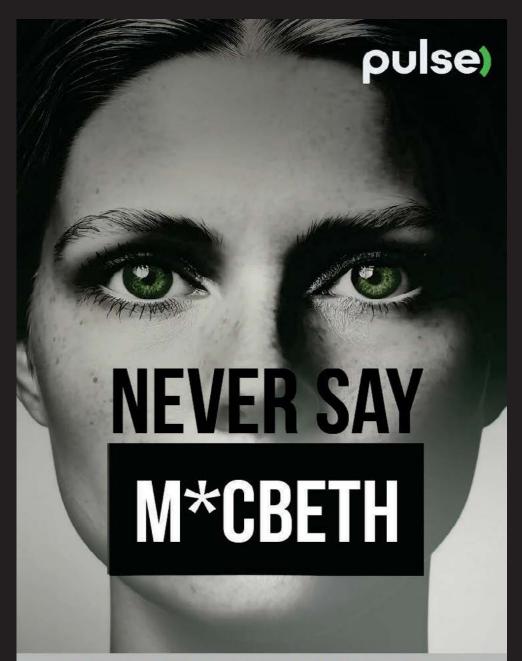
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
